Getting in on this group energy and engagement is what has kept me a regular



at the meetings since I joined the branch 8 years ago. My thanks to everyone in the branch for making ASCE membership a great experience.

As for our recent branch activities - there seems to be a steady supply of great local projects and we have been lucky this year to have had some standout presentations. The elephant in the room is the Elwha Dam Removal, which was presented to us by Mr. Don LaFord of URS. I'm sure you all know at least some details. Last spring the lower lake (Lake Aldwell) was open for hiking and I made it a point to go see the lakebed before the vegetation takes over. I have included a few photos from the NPS (after the jump) for your enjoyment.

Another standout presentation we enjoyed is probably news to most of you. The City of Gig Harbor removed 360 feet of concrete culvert along with 8,000 cy of fill and restored the estuary to Donkey Creek, a historical

## **Bio for April 16 Speaker**

Larry Schick is a former on air broadcast meteorologist and award winning environmental, science, and outdoor reporter. Larry was hired by the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers Seattle District in 2003 and works in Water Management as a meteorologist and dam regulator. He was named USACE Seattle District "Scientist of the Year" in 2009. He initiated and coauthored a peer-reviewed research paper: "Flooding in Western Washington: The Connection to Atmospheric Rivers". The paper was published in the De-



cember of 2011 issue of the Journal of Hydrometeorology.

Larry received a B.S. degree in Earth Science/ Weather Analysis & Forecasting from Northern Arizona University, Flagstaff in 1975. He began his career as a cartographer, and then worked for five years as an on air broadcast meteorologist for KSBW TV in Monterey, California. He moved to Seattle in 1983 to continue his career as a broadcast meteorologist for KING TV and others from 1983-2003.

salmon-bearing stream. The project, which was partially funded by HUD and USFWS, was completed in late 2013 on budget and ahead of schedule. The former road overlying the culvert was removed and a bridge installed in its place. One of the highlights of this approach was the ability for the City to construct a pedestrian path that crossed beneath the bridge and connected two City parks. Again, I have provided a few photos below. Enjoy!
